Timeliness:

- When was the information published or posted?
- Has the information been revised or updated?
- Is the information current or out-of-date for your topic?
- Are the links to other websites working?

Relevance:

- Does the information relate to your topic or answer your question?
- Is the information at an appropriate reading level?
- Have you looked at a variety of sources before choosing this one?
- Would you be comfortable using this source for a research paper?

Authority:

- Who is the author/publisher/source/sponsor?
- Is the author qualified to write on the topic?
- Is there contact information, such as a publisher or e-mail address?
- Does the URL reveal anything about the author or source?

Accuracy:

- Is the information supported by evidence?
- Can you verify any of the information in another source?
- Can you find sources cited or linked to the original source?

Purpose:

- What is the purpose of the information?
- Do the authors/sponsors make their intentions or purpose clear?
- Is the information fact? opinion? persuasion?
- Are there any biases? Do they only support one point of view?

- In-text citation: (Author, year of publication)
- References
 - o Electronic: second line is indented
 - Author(s). Title. Journal Name. Year; vol. (issue no.):inclusive pages. URL [provide the URL in this field; no need to use "URL:" preceding it]. Published [date]. Updated [date]. Accessed [date].
 - o Printed Journals: second line is indented
 - Author's surnames and initials. Title of article and subtitle (as applicable).
 Abbreviated name of journal. Year; Volume number (Issue number); Part or supplement number, when pertinent: Inclusive page numbers
 - Printed Books: second line is indented
 - Authors' surnames and first and middle initials. Title of book and subtitle, if any. Volume number and volume title, when there is more than one volume or Edition number (do not indicate first edition). Place of publication: Name of publisher; Year of copyright. Page numbers, when specific pages are cited.
